Based on the writings and body of work shared by Charlotte Mason, a 19th century educator, and centered on the idea of the child as a person made in the Image of God.	Focuses on building good habits which allow a child to develop to their full potential. An example would be the habit of attention, truthfulness, obedience, courtesy, kindness. A Liberal Education (encompassing a wide and generous curriculum with great variety) based on the three ideas that "Education is an Atmosphere, a Discipline, and a Life".	Short lessons nurture the habit of attention by allowing a reasonably short time for a child to focus on a lesson and then moving on. Short lessons allow for a liberal (wide) course of study. Uses living, worthy books as the vehicle to convey an education, and encourages the child to recognize "connections" on his own through his reading without being fed or forced the connections through text blurbs. Language Arts methods are centered around the context of the living books being read, and the cornerstones are narration (oral and written), copywork, studied dictations. Takes a theme of interest and incorporates and connects all the other subjects (math, language arts, history, science, poetry, etc.) around the theme or topic of interest. These tools help build a body of work based on the connected studies, and do so in ways that some families find attractive and engaging. Montessori Education

Based on the understanding and teaching of Dr. Maria Montessori, a Catholic doctor turned educator that believed that all children (poor and privileged) deserved an education. Recognizes the child as a person made in the image of God.	Specific tools and materials are often used in a Montessori education. These have been thoughtfully considered because of the great emphasis on the concrete and the work and presentations completed, but the frugal and creative homeschooling mother can often find ingenious and/or homemade substitutions around the home.	<u>Websites</u> * Montessori For Everyone * Our Father's House (offers many materials for Catechesis of the Good Shepherd instruction)
Focuses on moving a child from the concrete to the abstract through the child's work. Unschooling

Philosophy	Methods	Resources
This term and philosophy was founded by John Holt and is based on the idea of a child-led learning experience and the child interacting with his/her natural environment. The child communicates interest, the parent facilitates learning opportunities around that interest.	A child communicates a desire to learn a skill or a topic of interest. The parent then brainstorms with the child various experiences and books that facilitate that learning and provides a rich group of resources to the child. A skill may require learning across a wide body of other basic educational skills in order to communicate the skill or topic the child has interest in. A self-directed education which takes place in real world environments based on the idea that curiosity is natural in children. Takes into account a child's individuality in his/ her propensity to learn a particular skill.	Parents may "strew" books (sometimes called "strewing"), a term which indicates thoughtful placing of particular books around the home in order to invite a child to read on a given topic. All-In-One Curricula

Based on a traditional school experience and is often called "school in a box". These often require minimal preparation for the homeschooling mother since they come with pre-written lesson plans, but can be inflexible since they were not written to take into account the individual child. They can also be expensive. This approach would be similar or identical to the work, text books and assignments a student would find in a public or private school. Most often, there are few "extras" included and these curriculum stick to the basics. (There are exceptions to this from provider to provider)	Most curriculum providers usually offer support tailored to their own curriculum and requirements, record keeping, grading and transcript services as part of their package. Some curriculum providers require mailing in of course materials; others allow for submission online.
